# THE WORD

St. Therese of Lisieux (the Little Flower of Jesus) was a contemplative nun who lived in one convent in France for her entire life as a religious. She did simple things, like wash clothes and scrub floors. As a nun, she was never a missionary, a teacher, a nurse, or a social worker. However, she was proclaimed by the Church a "patroness of the missions."

Why? Because her prayers (and sacrifices) benefited the missions, and the Church wants us to follow her example of praying and offering sacrifices on behalf of missionaries throughout the world. The task of bringing men and women to the Lord is an enterprise of the entire Church.

In the first Scripture reading for this Sunday, we have Moses who raises his hands on a hill as the Israelites were engaged in battle. As long as Moses' arms were raised with the rod of God in his hand, the Israelites would be winning, but when he lowered them they started to lose. Moses' arms grew tired, so Aaron and Hur supported his arms, and the Israelites won. The enterprise of Moses involved the effort and labors of more than just Moses.

Then, in the Gospel for this Sunday, we hear our Lord encouraging us to be persistent in our prayers. This, indeed, is a quality of our prayer which we as a Church must have in pursuing the salvation of sinners which is a goal of World Mission Sunday, which happens to be this weekend.

The Church has missionaries throughout the word, people who have been sent to bring the saving message of Jesus Christ. We are to pray for them and offer sacrifices on their behalf. In fact Pope Pius XI talked about contemplative groups in relation to the apostolic ones when he said, "Much more is contributed to the growth and development of the Church by contemplative groups than by those who perform the actual labors, for it is they who call down from heaven the vivifying graces to irrigate the plowed fields of the other apostolic workers." (*Umbratilem*,1924)

But, contemplative priests, sisters, and brothers are not the only ones who can "hold up the arms" of our missionaries. The elderly, the sick, the homemaker who works at home, the executive who sits in front of a computer, the factory worker who monotonously assembles products on an assembly line, the city worker who collects re-cycling, and every person in the state of grace who cannot be a missionary because of time, circumstance, or state of life.

This means intentionally offering our "prayers, works, joys, and sufferings" every morning, at every Mass, and throughout the day for the missions and the apostolates of the Church. We must be like the widow in today's Gospel who persists. Our Lord will listen and bless our missionary endeavors, both here at home and throughout the world.
